

Duyen is the Power Up! Program Facilitator of the Boys and Girls Club of Winnipeg. Power Up! is an after-school academic support program for Inner Winnipeg children from grades one to seven. Duyen helps in creating engaging content for all subject areas that build upon the students' learnings from school.

Before becoming the program facilitator, Duyen was with the Boys and Girls Club as a Community Summer Investigator. Every summer, she helps new immigrants to improve their language, arts, and math skills. She accompanies them on field trips to orient them to Winnipeg's rich heritage.

"I see part of myself in each of the students. I hope that they benefit from the program like I did as a former Boys and Girls Club participant," says Duyen.

Growing up in Inner Winnipeg, Duyen aspires to cultivate a sense of purpose and belonging among young Inner Winnipeg students. She has been active in the community since high school. She has led Global Issues Aboriginal Networking Team, Student Council, and Sisler Teens Against Nicotine and Drugs. She was part of Sustainability Circle and Science Squad. Duyen graduated from high school with honours and received awards for her many activities.

Duyen is proud to be called a Westland Scholar. It inspires her to continue to impact a change in young students' lives. She thanks Westland for its selfless contribution to Inner Winnipeg students as well as for its belief in their capability to succeed.

GET TO KNOW A WESTLAND VOLUNTEER

Adam Smoluk

Film Professional

Adam Smoluk was recruited to volunteer with the Westland Foundation through Board Member Kathe Meseman in 2013. Adam personally connected with Westland's advocacy for young Winnipeggers' education. Encouraged by Westland's volunteer board's dedication and commitment, Adam decided to volunteer his skills for the Westland Foundation's fundraising events.

Adam currently serves as a program manager for Film Training Manitoba and organizes training and skills development for film professionals. As a professional filmmaker, his recent screenplay, Chance to Survive, was selected to the eQuinoxe Europe International Screenwriters' Master Class which took place in Lindau, Germany in October 2016. Adam was the only filmmaker from the Americas to be selected to the program this vear. Adam's notable works also include: his debut film HORSE THIEVES, which was awarded the Audience Choice Award for Best Feature Film at the Winnipeg International Film Festival and his second feature film, FOODLAND was broadcast on Super Channel and was included in the Gem Selections for critically acclaimed films. FOODLAND was acquired by Shaw and premiered on the Independent Film Channel (IFC). He contributed profiles on the Right Honourable Edward Schreyer and Manitoba Film and Music's CEO Carole Vivier for The Heart of Winnipeg, a book that profiles community leaders.

Adam studied on scholarship at the British American Drama Academy at Oxford University. He attended the National Screen Institute of Canada's Features First Program for Writers and Directors and was the youngest person ever selected to the program. Adam completed Red River College's Human Resource Management and Management Development programs with honours. As well, he holds a Career and Employment Coaching Certificate from The University of Winnipeg.

Adam has received numerous post-secondary scholarships and awards throughout his career. He was the first screenwriter ever to be shortlisted for the John Hirsch Award for Most Promising Manitoba Writer. Adam was awarded the Future Leaders of Manitoba Award, Investors Group scholarship for leadership studies at the Banff Centre, Manitoba Federation of Labour's Al Cerilli Scholarship, a scholarship for The Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Winnipeg Program, and an RBC Foundation Scholarship for governance training with Institute of Corporate Directors.

Adam advises students who are working on earning their educational credentials to apply for scholarships available in our community, such as Westland's. He highlights Westland's practical and responsive mandate of providing educational opportunities to young Winnipeggers who need them the most.

"Being selected as a scholar is a major accomplishment that you can carry with you for the rest of your life," he added.

Adam gives back to the community by volunteering with other charities in Manitoba aside from the Westland Foundation. He demonstrates his passion for youth empowerment by his volunteer involvement with the United Way of Winnipeg's GenNext Council as Chair, Youth Employment Services Manitoba as Vice Chair, Advisory Board of Directors for Essential Skills Manitoba as Vice Chair, and Canada Games as a committee member.

"Manitoba takes the lead on community service and volunteerism. Let us be involved in our community and be part of the positive change," he says.

"The Westland Foundation is an excellent organization to volunteer with. I encourage young professionals to lend your talents, skills, and resources to supporting the growth of this outstanding organization," Adam ends.
